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Smart Savings for Back-to-School

Cyber Security 101



Pokémon Go: A Cybersecurity No Go Pokémon Go has swept the nation like no mobile app before it. Look around you, and you'll most likely see someone on their phone trying to chase down a monster.

What is it? Pokémon Go is an augmented reality game that allows the player to travel between the real world and the virtual world of Pokémon-all with the goal of locating, capturing, and training virtual creatures. This game is an international obsession and since its release, has been a cyber hacker's dream. Why? Because the mobile app collects you, the user's personal information. This includes your name, email and geographical location. In addition to collecting personal information, users often time visit 3rd party sites to gain access to tips and tricks to conquer Pokémon and expose themselves to additional information leaks. If a cyber hacker gains access to your information, it could potentially be an open door to passwords, social security numbers, and other private information.

In order to help control this access, you need to first update your app. The newest version of the app has worked on fixing some of these leakages. However, you will also want to adjust your phones settings which can be toggled on and off to grant privilege to applications you download. Finally, be smart. No virtual creature is worth your identity.
